Interfaith Home & Hope Program provides housing for homeless families in one of our 25 lovingly decorated, furnished apartments. The apartments are rent-free if families enter the program unemployed. Upon obtaining employment, Interfaith requires a monthly occupancy charge of 30% of the net family income. To encourage savings, Interfaith returns 100% of that charge to families who save \$500 or more and successfully complete all other program requirements.

In addition to housing, parents are required to meet weekly with their personal success coach and financial empowerment coach to provide the accountability and support needed to reach their goals. Additionally, unemployed and underemployed parents must participate in our

Career Development Program until viable employment is obtained. We also provide on-site counseling, child-care assistance, afterschool & summer programs, and life skills training.

Through collaboration of the Texas Department on Aging, Access Center for the Elderly, the Dallas Area Agency on Aging and Catholic Charities of Dallas, Shared Housing Center was founded in 1984 as a shared program of the Brady Center and Center for Housing Resources. In 1987, Shared Housing Center was incorporated as a separate 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization and provided offices in the Wilson Historic District of the Meadows Foundation.

Shared Housing Center currently operates two distinct housing services along with a variety of supportive services, children’s programs and special projects which focus on self-sufficiency and family stability. Clients applying for our programs must pass a criminal background check and drug test.

Home share care programs – provides housing solutions for individuals who have housing with individuals in need of housing. Learn more

Group Residence Shelter– provides temporary supportive housing for homeless single parents mothers with children and older adults (age 50+).

Green Haus Community Coming soon! – 24 unit new construction with “green design.” The community will provide permanent supportive housing as well as temporary housing with a focus on homeless families and single older adults.

This program is for individuals who are ABC Behavioral Health clients. Potential residents may attend an informational program every Monday at ABC from 10:45-11:45. The housing program

provides 4 four-bedroom furnished houses, as well as 3 apartment complexes for permanent supportive housing. Most people will have roommates. Each client is assigned a case manager and encouraged to work on psychosocial skills, as well as employment. Individuals are given a curfew of 10:00 pm during the first 6 weeks of their housing, with no friends or visitors allowed on the grounds. After the first 6 weeks, clients may spend 2 nights away from home and entertain visitors twice a week. They must have a serious mental illness also. This housing is considered permanent, so residents can stay as long as they can take care of their own place.

This 18 month program provides a home for individuals dealing with substance abuse issues. The facility accommodates up to 53 men and 14 women in a roommate situation. Resident is required to maintain their sobriety while working to achieve permanent independent living. Food, clothing and toiletries are provided during the client's first month in the program, with a cafeteria on site. Rent is \$63/ week during the first month, and increase to \$98/week after that. Resident receiving SSI or Veteran Compensation are required to pay their entire monthly rent up front.

Requirements:

- Ability to pass a UA/ Breathalyzer
- Ability to pay rent
- Attend weekly house meetings, as well as seven AA/NA meetings per week
- Actively look for work between 9 am and 2 pm or volunteer in the community (if disable)

Exclusion:

- Individuals with sex offenses
- Individuals with arson convictions
- Individuals who have been charged with selling drugs in a school zone

Dallas Life is the largest homeless shelter in the Dallas area. It has three transitional living programs, which are designed to teach individual how to succeed in an independent living situation.

Requirements:

- Individual must be able to take care of their daily activities
- Actively participate in case management

- Individual 18+
- Drugs and alcohol are not allowed

Exclusions:

- Individuals with violent offenses
- Individuals with sexual offenses

NEW LIFE

This program offer classes in Anger Management, Resume Preparation, Money Management and Men's and Women's Issues. Program Director sees to it that individual counseling is offered and accountability is maintained.

OVERCOMERS

The Overcomers program was developed to assist homeless residents who have slight mental or physical disabilities. The program is designed to provide each participant with basic needs and at the same time, afford them the opportunity to apply for disability. The ultimate goal of the Overcomer Program is to stabilize one's life, prepare and retrain, so as to move a person toward and establish independent living in permanent housing, while living on a fixed income therefore becoming a more productive member of society. This faith-based program meets daily for twelve months with a variety of classes.

Requirements:

- Documentation of disability/ in the process of obtaining disability
- Unable to work
- Establish and remain on medication

SENIOR CITIZEN PROGRAM:

This program was developed to meet the needs of the increasing population of homeless senior resident. Dallas Life is able to provide a program to meet the basic needs of senior living as well as provide them with the opportunity to obtain permanent housing and training them for the challenges of living on a fixed income. Each resident is given the opportunity to file for social security and assistance in searching for housing. Caseworker's partner with other agencies to assist finding senior's permanent housing towards the end of the program. This faith-based program meets daily alongside of the Overcomer Program for twelve months and with a variety of classes and the same goals. Dallas Life is the only long-term program developed specifically for homeless seniors living in shelter in Dallas area

VETERANS PROGRAM

This program is done with partnership with the VA. The homeless veterans have a customized program just for them to meet their unique needs. Housing, daily needs, classes, clothing, laundry, counseling, etc. is all provided for the homeless veteran.

This program has thirty private rooms for homeless families. It is open to families in which all adults are able to work. This is not a Housing First program, therefore the families who enter Phase I of the transitional housing program are required to participate in casework services, follow up on referrals and participate in intense job search Parenting, budgeting, healthy relationship and other classes are help which clients must attend.

Requirements

- Families that include children (does not have to be “traditional” mom/dad and kids)
- Adults must be able to work

Exclusions

- Meth manufacturing charges are automatic exclusions from admission to any Family Gateway program. All other criminal charges (aside from sex offenses) are considered on a case-by-case basis
- Sex offenders
- Pregnant women – This facility is unable to extend their temporary shelter services to women who are expecting. They are able to provide *permanent supportive housing services* to women who are pregnant as long as the already have at least 1 other minor child with them in the home and they meet the other requirements of the program.

FAMILY GATEWAY TRANSITIONAL HOUSING - PHASE II (Apartment Housing)

This program has 20 two bedroom apartments for families. The This program is generally only open to those families who have completed the 16 week Phase I Transitional Housing Program. In very special specific cases, families may transition directly to phase II through other referral agencies without having to have completed the 16 week Center based program. Phase II is a 12 months program. While living in the apartments, the families will maintain casework services, counseling, referrals and job placements assistance. Parenting and budgeting classes are available for clients. Home inspections are mandatory.

Requirements

- Families that include children (does not have to be “traditional” mom/dad and kids)
- Parents must be able to work
- Major disabilities (physical or mental) – this is reviewed on a case-by-case basis. The facility will house those who have disabilities as long as they are able to work. It is important that the individual with the disability is seeking the appropriate medical care and, if they have been prescribed, is stable on their medications. Family Gateway can assist families with this if they have not been able to maintain treatment. If a family member is unstable to the point that intense medical care is required, the family will be referred to the appropriate agency/hospital/housing program so they can obtain that before coming into the program.

Exclusions

- Meth manufacturing charges are automatic exclusions from admission to any Family Gateway program. All other criminal charges (aside from sex offenses) are considered on a case-by-case basis
- Sex offenders
- Pregnant women – This facility is unable to extend their temporary shelter services to women who are expecting. They are able to provide *permanent supportive housing services* to women who are pregnant as long as the already have at least 1 other minor child with them in the home and they meet the other requirements of the program.

Women's Shelter

Genesis offers an Emergency Shelter, as well as a Transitional Housing Program (Annie's House) for women and children who are victims of domestic violence. The shelter is free and provides food, clothing, shelter and counseling. Clients are required to attend weekly individual and group therapy for the duration of their stay. Children are able to attend the on-site alternative Genesis School while their mothers become better equipped to live on their own. The maximum time the residents may stay in the emergency shelter is six weeks.

Annie's House

Once families have completed the Shelter Program, they are eligible to move on to Annie's House. This transitional home allows up to 18 families to live rent free for up to one year. to maintain a stable living environment. Genesis offers a variety of counseling programs, as well as legal services and parenting classes in hopes of preparing their clients for a positive and steady future.

Homeward Bound is a residential treatment facility for clients with substance abuse and mental health issues. Licensed counselors provide intensive residential treatment on a 24-hour/7-day

per week basis. The current HIV/AIDS facility is a 60-day rehabilitation center that houses 8 women and 16 men. Clients must be willing to participate in daily group sessions.

Requirements for Statewide HIV Program:

- HIV/AIDS diagnosis
- Recent labs (within the past 60 days)
- A copy of last physical exam, if available
- Current psychological evaluation
- Annual income at or below 200% of poverty
- Current substance abuser
- 2-month (60-day) supply of psychotropic and HIV medicines (or ability to get refills)
- Complete list of medications
- Negative TB test
- Legible photo ID (Texas resident) and Social Security card if available

Women and their children may stay at the shelter for up to 30 days. During their stay, residents are provided with food, clothing, counseling and educational services.

We also have transitional housing for survivors of DV and counseling/ group services that are not in shelter at our outreach offices. We also offer Batters Intervention and Prevention classes for offenders.

Long Term Transitional Housing

Individuals and families who are homeless can be in the transitional housing program for up to 24 months if continuous progress is being made toward self-sufficiency. This can be accomplished by increasing skills through education and or employment. We are not permanent supportive housing therefore clients must be able to work. HCC pays the rent directly to the apartment complex and the client is responsible for establishing and maintaining utilities. Therefore consistent monthly income is required. We have sheltered site housing and clients are placed solely based upon availability.

- Home Again is considered our family program even-though the program serves 12 families and 3 singles. (No pre-existing conditions are necessary to qualify)

Home and Hope transitional Housing Program

This 7 to 15 month program is available to help families who are at imminent risk of homelessness or literally homeless. Resident pay 30% of their income for rent and are offered individualized case management, job search assistance, budget mentoring and employment coaching. Families interested in this program may call the number above and schedule an interview with the Screening Coordinator.

Requirements

- You must be homeless with children (18 years of age and under) living in one of the following situations: Hotel/motel (paid by another person, church, etc.), Emergency or transitional shelter, Living with friends or family or have an evictions notice.
- At least 9 months consecutive employment in the 3 last years
- All adults must be able and willing to work at least 40 hours per week.
- Lived independently for at least two years
- No violent or sexual assault record
- MUST be drug free for a minimum of one year

Legacy Founders Cottage is a 7-bedroom home specifically for HIV/AIDS positive individuals. It includes three hospice room and four respite room. Each client gets their own bedroom, three meals a day, and 24-hour CNA care. The facility is funded by HOPWA and residents pay 30% of their income for monthly rent. The Program Director coordinates all doctors' appointments and works closely with Legacy Counseling Center to meet the emotional and physical needs of the clients. The Housing Coordinator ensures that the clients have a place to live when they leave the facility so they do not fall back into the cycle of homelessness

Requirements:

- HIV/AIDS diagnosis
- Need some aid with daily activities
- Individuals over 18 years of age

Exclusions:

- Recent violent felonies
- Significant medical aid – on contact/ports/holes
- Currently infected with TB

Short Term Emergency Housing Program (STEP)

No rent, 120-day emergency shelter. Clients live with roommates in furnished apartments, which are all in the same complex. Dedicated caseworker attempts to connect clients to permanent housing options.

Requirements:

- Homeless or at risk of losing housing
- Clean from illegal drugs and alcohol
- Able to live peacefully with roommates
- Single adult receiving mental health services at Metrocare Services

Safe Haven

This is a Dallas County's only HUD Safe Haven Program. Treatment participation is not mandatory, but encouraged. The idea is that stable housing must be provided before clients are able to deal with their mental illness or substance abuse issues. Safe Haven houses 25 single adults in furnished apartments, rent-free and provides three meals per day. Clients must be chronically homeless, and disabled per the federal definition. After 2 years, clients are encouraged to start saving money and preparing for independent living and self-sufficiency. Safe Haven provides 24-hour staffing and an onsite Case Manager.

Requirements:

- Chronically homeless by HUD's definition
- Able to live peacefully with community
- Verifiably disabled by a mental illness according to HUD's definition

This program is based on the 12 Steps and addresses anger management, decision-making, healthy relationships and socialization, relapse prevention, physical fitness, and life skills training. Residents live in a dormitory and are responsible for maintaining their own living environments. Residents attend an on-campus school 5 days per week, 6 hours per day. A weekly multi-family group is required for all residents and their families. Individual family therapy is available. Requirements:

- Adolescent women ages 13-17 years
- Stay between 30-90 days
- Have substance abuse

This program is designed for women ages 18 or older. While living in a dormitory setting, women participate in individual and group counseling on drug/alcohol addiction using the latest treatment modalities. Residents receive positive peer support and are assigned a primary counselor who remains with them during their stay. Counselors assess clients' factors that contribute to addiction (trauma, family dysfunction, mental health) and design and implement an individualized treatment plan to address the identified issues. Women are expected to maintain their living environment and to attend parenting classes. Transitional housing is one of the greatest needs for people that are not financially stable. R/O provides transitional housing for the “working poor,” this gives them time to rebuild their finances in a safe environment. Graduates of our adult residential program are also provided the opportunity to be part of our transitional housing once they begin working. The purpose of The Refuge is to provide transitional housing to facilitate self-sufficiency in Men, Women and Families that are coming out of a program, have recently lost their home or are having a hard time covering their current rent. The Refuge is not a shelter, nor is it a solution for long term housing. The Refuge is a place where people can come and get a respectable place to live while saving money, to get a better place to live. Reconciliation Outreach hopes that in this purpose The Refuge will improve the chances of its tenants to become independent, strong members of their community.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Intervention Services Called nexus Generations (PPI), our newest program offers expectant mothers or mothers with young children the support they need to create healthy family relationships. Services include case management, infant care and safety classes, drug education, parenting classes, and more:

Detoxification Services

The Teen Residential program is based on the 12 steps and addresses issues such as anger management, decision-making, healthy relationships, relapse prevention, physical fitness, and life skills training. Nexus is the only drug treatment facility in Texas that can accommodate a late-term or newly parenting teen. Typical length of stay is between 30 and 90 days. While in treatment

Our Programs

Routh Street Intensive Residential Treatment Program

Our 32-bed residential program provides a safe therapeutic environment with room and board, dual diagnosis classes, recovery and relapse prevention components, counseling and case management services. The focus is on assisting clients in managing themselves in the community. The average client residential stay is about 14 days.

Outpatient Program

Turtle Creek Recovery Center's Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP) is designed to help individuals struggling with addiction who would benefit from a structured day program. We offer an evidence-based curriculum that incorporates best practices in substance abuse treatment, including counseling, education, and skills training. IOP offers individualized care for persons struggling with addiction, as well as continuity for clients following completion of residential treatment.

Outpatient groups meet Monday through Friday from 9 am to 12 pm or 1 pm to 4 pm, with coffee and snack breaks. A light breakfast and lunch are also provided. Successful completion of IOP usually takes between four to six weeks. After IOP graduation, we offer continued care in our Supportive Outpatient Program (SOP), which helps bridge the transition out of treatment. Bus passes are offered to clients who have transportation challenges. Outpatient clients have access to our counseling and support services.

Vocational Assistance

Clients receive information and referrals to various job search and employment resources in the community.

Housing Referrals

Clients receive information and referrals to various housing resources in the community, with the aim of identifying available transitional, supportive, or permanent housing options.

Service Coordination

We provide information and referral to persons needing services, conduct clinical assessments, and aim to assist our clients to make a seamless transition from one program to another.

The Dallas Housing Authority (DHA) has a simple mission - to provide qualified families with safe, decent and affordable housing of the highest quality consistent with available funding. The uncertain economic times we are experiencing have made the way the mission is carried

out more critical than ever. We have to ensure that we rein in administrative spending to maximize the funding available to improve the properties we own, explore new development opportunities in a wider range of neighborhoods and expand our partnerships with others who share our vision.
